Here is what an E I N unlocks. Business bank accounts, most banks require one. Licenses and permits from your state. Contracts, licensing deals, and sponsorships. And royalty collection, many platforms require an E I N to pay you.

Applying is simple, and it is free. Visit I R S dot gov and find the E I N application portal. Select your business structure. Provide your business details. Then submit, and if you apply online, your E I N is issued immediately. Prefer paper? Form S S 4 works too, it just takes a few weeks.

The benefits add up fast. You can file business taxes separately from personal taxes. You can claim deductions for equipment, travel, and marketing. And you can access loans, grants, and funding that require a registered business.

Quick answers to common questions. Cost? Free through the I R S, so skip the third party services. Timeline? Online is immediate, paper takes four to six weeks. And yes, your E I N is permanent. Even freelancers should get one, royalty platforms often require it.
